One of the must-see attractions on Lake Iseo is Monte Isola, the largest inhabited lake island in Europe and a destination where time seems to slow down. Just a short ferry ride away, it captivates visitors with its charming villages, cobbled streets, and the near absence of cars, allowing bicycles and leisurely walks to take center stage. From Peschiera Maraglio to Carzano, every corner reflects centuries-old fishing traditions and local craftsmanship. A climb to the Sanctuary of Madonna della Ceriola, perched at the island's highest point, rewards visitors with breathtaking views over Lake Iseo and the surrounding Prealps.

Among the highlights of Lake Iseo, Franciacorta stands out as one of Italy's most renowned food and wine regions. Located among the rolling hills south of the lake, between Brescia and the Sebino area, it is famous for its high-quality traditional method sparkling wine, produced through secondary fermentation in the bottle. The name "Franciacorta" derives from "francae curtes," referring to medieval monastic courts that were exempt from taxation. Today, the region is synonymous with prestigious wineries, villages nestled among neatly ordered vineyards, and a harmonious hillside landscape. Alongside wine, local cuisine showcases lake fish, cured meats, cheeses, and extra virgin olive oil, offering an authentic experience.

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
